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Upgrades to the City's Utility Billing System


The city has been working to modernize and enhance our systems and software, with the Utility Billing system being the first in line for an upgrade. This update brings you the convenience of receiving your utility bills via email and the option to sign up for various notifications, including reminders for past due bills. To get started, simply log into your account, add your email address, and select the email billing option.

Our updated system offers additional features to make managing your utility bills more straightforward. You now have the flexibility to make payments through our Text to Pay service or by phone using the IVR system. These payment methods accept credit and debit cards, providing you with real-time access to your balances and due dates.

ALL online transaction will incure a \$2.00 third-party processing fee which is not collected by the city. Additionally, for **both in-person and online credit and debit card** transactions, there will be a 3% processing fee. Please be aware that this fee is also a third-party charge.

Patrol Division

From the Police Department



The Oak Ridge North Police Department's patrol division operates 24/7, diligently responding to the needs of our community and its citizens. These dedicated officers, easily recognizable in their distinctive police uniforms and marked patrol cars, are the face of our department and are the first to respond when you need assistance.

The role of the Oak Ridge North Patrol Division is pivotal in maintaining law and order within our city and the surrounding areas. They proactively identify and address potential issues before they escalate into major problems, serving as a visible deterrent to criminal activity and ensuring public safety. Whenever you call for help, our patrol officers are often the quickest to respond.

Beyond their presence, these officers



provide valuable support in criminal investigations. They secure crime scenes, gather evidence, conduct initial investigations, interview witnesses and suspects, and collaborate with the district attorney's office to determine if criminal charges are warranted. When necessary, they also make arrests and forward cases to the investigative division for further follow-up.

One of the most visible functions of the patrol division is traffic enforcement. Oak Ridge North Patrol Officers actively patrol the streets, identifying traffic infractions and stopping violators as needed. The mere sight of a police car on the road can often deter traffic violations, contributing to safer streets, fewer motor vehicle accidents, and overall improved public safety.

Time to Winterize Your Pipes

Do you recall that one time when the temperature dropped significantly, and for a brief moment, Texas felt the chill? It's a rare occurrence in this part of the country, but it happened. Remember how, just a few hours later, you discovered your pipes had given in to the cold, leaving you with quite a headache? That certainly must have put a damper on your day!

If you head over to your local hardware store now, you can pick up some "Armaflex" pipe insulation and, of course, a trusty roll of duct tape (because, let's be honest, duct tape can fix



just about anything!). While the fall weather is still pleasant, it's an excellent time to take preventive measures by wrapping your pipes and outdoor faucets. You can even find specialized faucet insulation covers to make access easier, avoiding the hassle of unwrapping layers of duct tape, if necessary. Taking a little time now to insulate your pipes can save you a world of trouble and money down the road. By doing so, you'll likely prevent the need to replace broken pipes or call in a plumber for major repairs. Plus, you won't be surprised by an unusually high water bill due to an undetected leak.

For those with irrigation systems, don't forget to insulate the backflow preventer. Last year, some unfortunate folks discovered the hard way that backflow preventers can trap water, leading to freezing and a costly device breakage. You might find



yourself with an unintended fountain in your yard if you're not careful!

So, why not take care of this task now? When the temperatures inevitably drop below freezing, you can sit back comfortably with a cup of hot chocolate (or perhaps something stronger) and watch your neighbors struggle in the cold, wet weather as they desperately attempt to wrap their insulation with duct tape, all the while wishing they had heeded this advice.

The Importance of a Backflow Preventor

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) Code Rule 344.50 clearly stipulates that any irrigation system connected to a public or private potable water supply must be linked through a backflow prevention method approved by the commission. Additionally, the rule outlines specific types of backflow preventers that are permissible under particular conditions.

All backflow preventers used in irrigation systems share a common purpose: to maintain the flow of water in one direction and prevent the contamination of the irrigation system's water from backflowing into both your family's potable (safe for drinking) water supply and the city's water supply.

It's crucial to recognize that irrigation water is not merely a pollutant in terms of odor or color; it poses a health hazard. Toxic chemicals like fertilizers, pesticides, and animal waste have the potential to flow back into your drinking water if not effectively prevented. Ordinary valves responsible for turning your irrigation system on and off are insufficient in preventing backflow, as they may be open during a backflow event (when your sprinkler system is in operation) or can become damaged or leak. This is why a backflow preventer is essential for your protection. Even some automatic valves, such as electric solenoid valves, may not entirely halt backflow when fully closed and "off" since their design allows for slight opening during a backflow event.


How do backflows occur? Ordinarily, the water pressure in your home's water supply keeps irrigation water from reversing its flow. However, abrupt drops in pressure can create a negative pressure in the home's main supply, resulting in a siphoning effect that causes water to flow in reverse. While such events are infrequent, water from sprinkler lines can be drawn into the primary water supply and, from there, into household plumbing fixtures such as bathtubs, sinks, showers, toilets, and faucets. This can happen when your water company shuts off the water for maintenance or installs new pipes. Even firefighters pumping water from fire hydrants can cause nearby areas' water pressure to drop, leading to backflow occurrences in those areas.

Winterizing a PVB (Pressure Vacuum Backflow) Device:

- 1. Begin by shutting off the isolation valve.
- 2. If you have a controller, set it to the "off" or "rain" mode position.
- 3. Locate the two test cocks designed for testing or draining the main cavity of the backflow device. Use a small flat-

- head screwdriver to turn the screw in the center of each test cock one-quarter turn (45-degree angle) to open them. Expect water to discharge with some pressure, followed by dripping for a short period.
- 4. Adjust the #1 and #2 shutoff handles to a 45-degree angle or halfway off position, and keep them in this position until you're ready to reactivate your system.
- 5. Insulate the device using foam pipe wrap and secure it with heavy rubber tape to protect the insulation. Cover the device with an insulation bag.
- 6. To restart your system, remove the insulation bag and open the isolation valve (water will shoot out of the test cocks). Close the test cocks by turning the screw in the center to the closed position (screw slot vertical) to stop water from spraying out of the backflow device. Turn the #1 and #2 shutoff handles to the fully open position (handles aligned with the pipe's flow). You can keep the insulation on throughout the winter, except when running the system. Set your controller accordingly.

For an effective winterization process, it's advisable to use your controller to assist in draining the system. To do this, activate the lowest elevation zone on the controller and let it run. Then, turn off the isolation valve and drain the unit. Once these steps are completed, switch the controller to the "off" position.
